THINKING ALLOWED

Opportunities and challenges for our counselling service

Ali Groves knew exactly what she wanted to do when she qualified as a counsellor back in 2015. Having lived in Clitheroe much of her life, she realised that many people in the Ribble Valley desperately needed help with their mental health. But long NHS waiting lists and expensive private counselling services meant that they



were having to struggle on without the support they needed. Ali had seen evidence of that when she was a volunteer at the Foodbank. So as a committed Christian she believed that she was being called to set up an 'affordable' counselling service for the Valley. That call seemed to be confirmed when RVGT agreed to take her project under its wing. Space was found for an office and counselling rooms at St James' Church and GT Counselling came into being.

For Ali, as a counsellor, there was an attraction in being part of a team of counsellors. There was mutual support the and encouragement, and opportunity to work with student counsellors as part of their training. Since its inception GT Counselling has worked with over 280 clients, and most clients attend on average for about 12 sessions. Some though, often those suffering deep trauma, need many more sessions and only stop coming when they feel they are ready. always says 'if it is working for you, we will keep working with you'. healing takes time, and the warm welcome given by the voluntary 'welcomers' is a key part of that process.

But the counselling service faces challenges as well as opportunities. Ali says she has struggled with the level of demand for counselling from day one. She deliberately doesn't advertise the service and has had to close the waiting list twice in the last few years. The rise in demand is due to a number of things, but Ali believes the on-going consequences of COVID, and the issues the NHS is having with counselling waiting lists, means more people are looking elsewhere for help with their mental health.

And there is so much more that could be done. If partnership funding was available, the service could offer some payment to their qualified counsellors, so they didn't have to work for free. This might entice more counsellors, and specialist counsellors to join the service. Ali regularly meets people who say that GT Counselling made a major difference to their lives because of the Christian care and counselling they received. And that has made it all so worthwhile. We are going to miss her commitment and her pioneering leadership.

The Church Times has reported that the part played by churches and faith "social groups prescribing" connecting people to communitybased activities to benefit their wellbeing — presents a possible pathway improving health outcomes. Quoting a report from the think tank Theos, published in January, the newspaper said that "NHS and social care services in England are stretched breaking point, grappling with GP record-high demand appointments and secondary care **GP** services. Yet. in five one appointments are not for medical reasons, but rather requests for help with issues like loneliness, housing, or debt."

Church groups are keen to be involved in this kind of work, the report says, "because at a community level they believe in 'loving their neighbour' as part of their Christian social action."

Strong safeguarding practices aren't just about identifying and preventing harmful behaviour; they're about unleashing the full potential of our work, allowing us to truly embody Christ's love and make a lasting, transformative impact on the world. Let safeguarding be the driving force behind everything we do, creating a culture where everyone feels safe, cherished, and empowered to thrive.



We wanted to let you know that the RVGT Trustees approached TrustAdvice, an independent HR agency recommended by Trussell, to ask them to look at the way we managed the HR issue which emerged at the Foodbank last year. We have now received their report. Although it was addressed to the Trustees we wanted to make you aware of it.

It does contain specific comments relating to individuals which the Board is not able to make public. But we are content that the following represents a fair summary of TrustAdvice's findings:

- ☐ The report found that the Trustees acted in good faith throughout.
- Some recommendations were made regarding tightening up on HR procedures and the Trustees have taken note of these.
- ☑ Suggestions were made regarding delegated authority and making it clearer what falls within an employee's remit and what would require Board approval. Again, the Trustees have taken note of these.
- Suggestions were made around communication between Trustees and from Trustees to staff, including not using personal email addresses for RVGT communications. We have already implemented these suggestions.

The Trustees are committed to good governance and are grateful for the report from TrustAdvice and the opportunity to improve our governance.
